A quorum being duly present, President Craig Tamash called the May 28, 2026, Town Council meeting to order at 6:32 P.M. Due to technical difficulties the Town Council meeting started late.

Jim Kupfer, Director of Planning and Development discussed a recent study which named the Town of Barnstable as a hot bed for supporting our business community. He mentioned the one stop shop place on our website Businessbarnstable.com. He added this website, the Building Department, the Health Department, the local events supporting our local community and a dedicated permit coordinator all helped to start successful business in Barnstable.

Bob Frazee gave an update on the commission projects.

Discussion:

(Tamash) encouraged the board members to send updates and new ideas to himself, or Vice-President Clark or Councilor Bloom. (Keane) Please discuss the building demo which was delayed for 18 months. (Frazee) The address of the building was 49 Putnum Avenue. Applicant withdrew without prejudice the application to move it. (Ludtke) Asked about buildings on the federal historic list. (Frazee) said there were 75 buildings in Barnstable as well as contributing buildings in Hyannis port. (Bloom) noted it was a great commission, and the commission was lucky to have a dedicated chair.

Lynne Poyant, gave an update on the commission.

Workshop

- **Review of Seasonal Communities program requirements, James Kupfer, Director of Planning and Development**

State Senator Julian Cyr discussed the Seasonal Communities regulations. Jim Kupfer, Director of Planning and Development gave an overview and utilized a PowerPoint presentation.

Discussion:

(Daluz) had questions regarding the average monthly rents and availability of parking. (Ludtke) How can we sign up for the program. (Cyr) 2/3 Council vote to approve and get it out. There is an Advisory Seasonal Committee looking in to how to advise and what is missing, Lisa Lopez is the program head. (Keane) what about the tiny homes. (Cyr) people are already doing these homes and there is a lot of constituents that are in favor of it. (Sheingold) What about the new housing and the sewer projects. (Cyr) The state is silent so the communities are on their own. (Crow) discussed the housing regulation for only one unit is allowed on a single piece of land (Kupfer) Yes, the principal dwelling is the only home on the property. One can have a tiny home as an Assessor's Dwelling Unit (ADU) but nothing else. (Bloom) Said he was alarmed about the housing as he had fears about the future and lack of housing available. (Cyr) mentioned there are some examples of housing working in other areas of the nation for example Vail, Colorado. He added everyone understands we have a housing problem. (Tamash) questioned the residential exemption as the 5 Fire Districts could not offer that (Cyr) hoped to look at that issue. (Crow) Felt the Short-Term Rentals should have better regulations. He urged State Senator Cyr to make it more regulations for second home owners. (Cyr) said it was up to the community Barnstable and all the other towns have the tools lets try to make them stronger.

Karen Nober, Town Attorney gave the rationale. She explained due to the procedural aspects of the April 16th Town Council meeting agenda item 2026-139 did not pass. She said the Airport will like to bring back the appropriation item.

Discussion:

(Sheingold) Lets reconsider it and give the money. (Nober) We will allow you to bring back the item not actually the same agenda item but a new request. (Ludtke) Why bring it back when it was a no vote. (Nelson) Mike Nelson, Airport Manager was informed of the no vote. He explained we are planning on using our reserve funds as we are not in favor of a loan. (Bloom) explained he was not in favor of expanding the runway. He felt that bigger jets bring more noise pollution. (Ludtke) Will we be seeing this regardless of how we vote tonight. (Nelson) There are no guarantees in life as the Airport Manager I am looking at the growth we lose a lot of jobs. My commitment is to keep the airport as self sufficient as possible. He noted the Airport Commission and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) wants this extended runway. (Ludtke) You work for the Town this is the only opportunity for the Town to have its say. Do we want to be a mecca for the rich people's jets. This should be discussed at the Strategic Planning meeting. (Daluz) You have a job and so do I. This will bring poor air and water quality. I am all set.
