



Town Council Meeting
May 14, 2026

A quorum being duly present, President Craig Tamash called the May 14, 2026, Town Council meeting to order at 6:00 P.M.

An announcement was made by President Tamash regarding the meeting being televised live and questioning if anyone was actively taping the session to please make their presence known. This session is recorded and broadcast on Channel 8 or Channel 1072.

Councilor Ludtke introduced and welcomed, Army veteran Captain Naomi Czupryna to lead the pledge of allegiance followed by President Tamash who asked all to remain standing for a Moment of Silence for all that have served our country and those near and dear to us.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

President Tamash asked all who would like to comment, to sign in, wait to be recognized by the presiding officer, and direct your three-minute comments to the Town Council. Written comments are always welcome please email at Council@barnstable.gov.

Karen Kim MacGuire read aloud comments from Laura Cronin, President of the Greater Hyannis Civic Association regarding the January 20th, 2026, letter submitted to Town Council discussing the 460 West Main Street Shelter. She urged Town Council to have a public meeting to talk about the homeless shelter move from Winter Street to West Main Street. She felt there had not been any communication regarding the homeless shelter move. She noted there was a petition to schedule the public meeting.

Linda spoke about Neighbors in Need helping to solve homelessness in Barnstable. She felt 77 Winter Street is a revolving door. She noted the state funding for the homeless has ties to many regulations.

Rick Brigham opposes the homeless shelter move to West Main Street. Please look at the successful models that address homelessness – these work. He does not believe the 460 West Main Street shelter will address the needs of the homeless.

Ken Barron spoke about costs and questioned the spending regarding \$786,000 feasibility study. He felt it was a lot of money. He urged Council to take a look at what we are spending and scrimp a little.

Xavier Breton urged Council to help with the homelessness as it can be reduced.

Ashauri Martin urged Council to preserve the art of West Main Street. She felt the move of the homeless shelter to 460 Main Street threatens our neighborhood. She hoped the Council would reject the shelter move and protect the businesses and families.

Ludtke agreed with Ken Barron that we need to take a look at the items and we need to understand the

Discussion:

(Ells) We have written letters in support of the \$450 million bond authorization for clean water and wastewater infrastructure. We need to stand together (the different communities) and fight this Environmental Bond Bill and remove section 108 as it will impact our water projects and subsidy funding from the State Revolving Funds (SRF) We have communicated with State Representative Diggs and State Senator Cyr as there is still a chance to amend (Clark) Thank you Senator Cyr for the funding for Silent Springs. Open Space Walking Weekend begins May 15th. (Tamash) Grand Reopening of Sandy Neck Beach Park on May 21, 2026. He added the work done was unbelievable.

MINUTES:

Upon a motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to accept the minutes of April 30, 2026, as presented.

President Tamash stated at the April 16th, 2026, Town Council voted for the agenda item 2026-139 which was an Appropriation and loan order in the amount of \$65,000 for the purpose of funding the permitting for Taxiway D and Runway 15-33 extension project as outlined in the fiscal year 2027 – fiscal year 2031 Capital Improvement Plan. He added Agenda Item 2026-139 received an eight (8) Yes and three (3) no vote. Attorney Nober explained there were ten (10) agenda items for that meeting, some needed a 2/3 present and voting approval, and some needed a 2/3 full council approval. She noted the minutes should reflect agenda item 2026-139 did not receive the 2/3 full council approval. Meaning agenda item 2026-139 on April 16th, 2026, at the Town Council meeting failed to garner the votes needed for approval.

Upon a motion duly made and seconded, it was voted all Councilors agreed that Agenda Item 2026-139 did not pass at the April 16, 2026, Town Council meeting.

COMMUNICATIONS - from elected officials, boards, committees and staff, commission reports, correspondence, and announcements:

- **Waterways Committee update: Paul Everson, Chair**

Paul Everson gave an update and overview of the Waterways Committee.

Discussion:

(Ludtke) Do we do rafting – multiple boats tie together side-by-side to a single, shared mooring. (Everson) Yes a few but it takes two (2) permits. We have rent-a-mooring in Cotuit and in North Bay for traveling boats when they visit Cape Cod. (Clark) Do we have a balance access to a working waterfront with slips and piers. (Everson) Will discuss at a workshop - opening moorings in Blish Point. (Clark) There are concerns with the waitlist and would like some moorings for the Bluewater economy. She felt the waterfront was becoming too gentrified. (Keane) agrees with Vice-president Clark felt some moorings should be set aside for working boats.

- **Workshop - Setting Speed Limits in Barnstable**

Daniel W. Santos, Director of Public Works, gave an update utilizing a PowerPoint presentation. He introduced Griffin Beaudoin, P.E., Town Engineer, James Kupfer, Director, Planning and Development, Jean Challies, Chief, Barnstable Police Department Sgt. Troy Perry, Traffic Division, Barnstable Police Department as they were at the meeting to offer insight and/or answer questions.

Discussion:

(Keane) asked about the number of 2025 crashes (Santos) I do not have that information. (Keane) two (2) miles per hour difference in speed seems small as the survivability increases by ten (10) percent. (Santos) Not for vehicle crashes. (Keane) How many people get hit by cars. (Challies) We have the information that was prepared and given to Kristen Terkelsen. Will look for it. (Ludtke) Mentioned there were children hit by vehicles at school grounds. She questioned the difference of 30 miles per hour versus 28 miles per hour. (Burdick) said collect data – and felt people are not really speeding. He cautioned that adoption of the regulation should be a little at a time. He noted that speed signs are not helping. (Challies) discussed the data – 2021-2023 there were 409 vehicle crashes throughout Cape Cod with ten (10) fatalities. Town of Yarmouth had four (4) deaths which is considered significant for a location/town. More discussion is needed and her concern was the high number of complaints with traffic enforcement. (Clark) questioned the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) study as it focused on ten (10) roads which had the white speed signs. (Sheingold) Had questions regarding public versus private roads. Is there a speed limit for private roads (Santos) Town does not currently put speed limit signs on private roads. (Keane) How to determine public roads versus private road. (Penn) Councilor Burdick made sense. Town's data does show a speeding problem as it is a perception problem. I vote no change. (Ludtke) Wants to establish speed limits (Santos) Statutory speed limit if cannot be thickly settled then it will be thirty (30) miles per hour. (Tamash) stated he was not in favor of proposal. People drive the speed they are comfortable with driving. (Santos) There is a bill regarding cameras for speed and red light if supportive of this then it can be utilized in the future. (Sheingold) useful workshop with concepts for future meeting. (Tamash) Will discuss it further thank you.

Discussion:

(Keane) What is different why the study. (Ahearn) this is a massive scale compared to a residential roof project. It is like any other Capital Improvement Project (CIP) we do design first.

Upon a motion duly made and seconded it was

ORDERED: That the amount of **\$786,488** be appropriated for the purpose of paying feasibility study and schematic design costs and associated project management for the potential roof replacement projects at the Barnstable High School (**\$588,874**), located at 744 West Main Street, Hyannis, MA, and the Barnstable Intermediate School (**\$197,614**), located at 895 Falmouth Road, Hyannis, MA, including the payment of all costs incidental or related thereto (the "Projects"), which proposed repair Projects would materially extend the useful life of the schools and preserve assets that otherwise are capable of supporting the required educational programs, and for which the Town of Barnstable, through the Barnstable School Committee, has applied for grants from the Massachusetts School Building Authority ("MSBA"), said amount to be expended under the direction of the Barnstable School Committee. To meet this appropriation the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Town Council, is authorized to borrow **\$786,488** under and pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 44, Section 7 or 8, or pursuant to any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor. The Town of Barnstable acknowledges that the MSBA's grant program is a non-entitlement, discretionary program based on need, as determined by the MSBA, and if the MSBA's Board of Directors votes to invite the Town to collaborate with the MSBA on the proposed repair Projects, any project costs the Town of Barnstable incurs in excess of any grant that may be approved by and received from the MSBA shall be the sole responsibility of the Town of Barnstable; and that, if invited to collaborate with the MSBA on the proposed repair Projects, the amount of borrowing authorized pursuant to this vote shall be reduced by any grant amount set forth in the Project Funding Agreement(s) that may be executed between the Town of Barnstable, through the Barnstable School Committee, and the MSBA. It is further Ordered that the appropriation and loan order under Town Council agenda item 2026-068 for **\$350,000** for the purpose of paying feasibility study and schematic design costs and associated project management for the potential roof replacement project at the Barnstable High School, located at 744 West Main Street, Hyannis, MA, be rescinded, and the appropriation and loan order under Town Council agenda item 2026-069 for **\$350,000** for the purpose of paying feasibility study and schematic design costs and associated project management for the potential roof replacement project at the Barnstable Intermediate School, located at 895 Falmouth Road, Hyannis, MA, be rescinded.

Discussion:

(Ludtke) questioned if the executive sessions were on the website. She inquired about how much money was spent on outside council for the cases. (Nober) \$269,000 for the first case which was dismissed and there was no discovery needed. Second Case is \$528,000 that is current through March 2026. (Clark) Is there a chance as the case develops, it could be found frivolous. Can any money be recouped. (Ludtke) Is the state providing any funds. (Nober) No state funding.

Discussion:

(Keane) Understand this is a financing devise where the municipality kicks in some funds but wondering why we are engaging in tax reductions when they are not necessary. (Kupfer) The tax increment exemption (TIE) is our tool. Policy can be moved forward if the policy is changed then there does not need to be a TIE agreement. (Penn) said she hates the TIE and TIF (Tax Increment Financing). She said she was greatly saddened by the changes to Doctor Robinson's home property. (Ludtke) explained she could not support the TIE agreement as we were facing a debit exclusion. (Clark) Added she was not likely to support this item. (Sheingold) felt there was rationale for this negotiation. Policy could change but, in this situation, there was precedence. He spoke about the Committee that recommended the TIE agreement they felt that it was a sense of fairness of what the previous councils had before approved for applicants. (Bloom) felt there should be some negotiation and just not say no. (Burdick) We should decide as council and be fairer and more transparent. (Levesque) You have to act in good faith thank you for investing in our community. Doctor Robinson's home has had a rough life after him. Thank you for investing in our town. (Dennis Mason Applicant) said when building they tried to keep the character of the cape.

(Milne) We have \$350,000 in unencumbered salary, which breakdown of \$200,000 for Police and \$150,000 for Public Works. (Ludtke) this still concerns me please look at the other ways to accomplish the work. Suggested outsourcing the work.
