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| Identifies the number and name of all 19 creditable CRS activities, as organized under 4 categories. |
| Describes the overall objective of the activity as described in the CRS Coordinator's Manual. |
| Provides a brief narrative summary of the activity. |
| Identifies the unique code for each element (acronym that is used in CRS credit calculations). |
| Identifies the name of each element (basic credit level for CRS). |
| Includes summary of the element as described in the CRS Coordinator's Manual. |
