



Horizontal Directional Drilling on Route 28

Starting Monday, December 19th through December 23rd horizontal directional drilling will be used for sewer pipe installation at the intersection of Route 28 and Strawberry Hill Road.



Horizontal Directional Drilling

1. Pilot bore drilling

drilling bit is steered along the planned route.

Trenchless method with less disturbance

2. Reaming

A reamer replaces the drill bit, enlarging the bore head diameter. Soil is removed hydraulically and mechanically.

3. Pipeline installation

Prefabricated pipeline is pulled back from the exit point into the clean bore hole at the entry point, completing installation.



Strawberry Hill Road, from West Main Street to Route 28 and from Route 28 to Wequaquet Lane, will be closed to accommodate this work. Roadways will remain open to resident traffic only and businesses will remain open throughout construction.




Formal road closure and posted detours will be in place, along with police details to assist in directing traffic. As always, please slow down and use extreme caution when traveling through the road construction areas, and follow posted safety and detour signs.

The Barnstable County Human Rights Advisory Commission hosted their Annual International Human Rights Day Awards Celebration on December 14th. We share the stories of these honorees with you.



Matthew Levesque

As President of the Barnstable Town Council, Matthew worked with intention to connect with and to engage under-represented residents of Barnstable. This includes extensive outreach to ensure that Brazilian and Latinx populations on Cape Cod had equal access to COVID information and vaccines. He continues to deliver food through the Brazilian Health Ministry. He helped guide and support remote access for residents of the Town of Barnstable during public comment and public hearings at Town Council meetings, providing inclusion for people who cannot physically participate due to job situations, transportation issues, family commitments, etc. He also helped revise the application process for boards, committees, and commission to better engage all residents of the Town of Barnstable, leading to greater representation in Town activities.

Dr. Debra Dagwan

Debra has advanced civil right and human rights on Cape Cod for many years.

She served on the Barnstable Town Council, the Barnstable School Committee, the NAACP and Barnstable No Place for Hate. She has focused her work on civil rights, racial justice, equality for women and those with disabilities and supporting LGBTQ rights. She is a health advocate and counselor for those experiencing domestic violence and for those experiencing domestic violence and for those with special needs.





Paul Hebert

Guided by his generous spirit, Paul works tirelessly to support people who are homeless. He and his wife began the Champ House (now Champ Homes) to provide transitional housing for adults in need. He is a veteran and served on the Barnstable Town Council for 9 years. Paul always helps people find a place to call home.

Michael Mecenas

Michael is focused on keeping our community healthy and ensuring equal health access for all. He is the founder and director of Health Ministry, a nonprofit organization created to provide services for immigrants and low income families on Cape Cod and the Islands. He has done critical work with the Hispanic community for over 20 years, including focusing on language access and community health education and resources.

Reasons to Compost at the Transfer Station

GET FOOD WASTE OUT OF THE LANDFILL AND GIVE IT NEW LIFE AS COMPOST!



Environment Benefits

Largest environmental benefit of any type of recycling. Compost can help aid reforestation, wetlands restoration, and habitat revitalization efforts by improving contaminated, compacted, and marginal soils.

Reduces Methane

Municipal solid waste (MSW) landfills are the third-largest source of human-related methane emissions in the United States, accounting for approximately 14.5 percent of these emissions in 2020.



Good for the Planet

Compost helps plants grow faster and remove more CO2 from air. Provide nutrients and prevent soil erosion: less chemical fertilizer and irrigation.

Land Use Benefit

Waste reduction is another benefit of compost, since compost is generally made from waste (food scraps, organic byproducts, etc) that is diverted from landfill flows. This reduces the amount of waste going to landfills and it upcycles those materials into a productive, environmentally beneficial product.

Don't Compost

Walnut Shells (may be toxic to some plants & animals) * Diseased Plants * Human or Pet Waste * Kitty Litter * Glass * Plastic * Metal (e.g. twist ties) * Cardboard * Styrofoam * Rubber Bands * Aluminum Foil

Reasons to Compost at the Transfer Station

GET TEXTILES OUT OF THE LANDFILL - REDUCE THE WASTE STREAM



Environment Benefit

95% of textiles can be reused. Conserves raw materials, fossil fuels and pesticides.

Reduces greenhouse gases

Textile recycling decreases the amount of trash we bury in landfills or burn in municipal waste combustors.





Employment Opportunities

Benefits and generates small local companies and nonprofits and creates jobs.

Saves landfill space

Keeping used textiles out of the trash reduces disposal costs for local government, businesses and residents.





Good for the Community!

Donated textiles provide low-cost quality clothing and household linens to residents with a limited budget.

What to donate:

Clothing, handbags, backpacks, shoes, Household textiles (even stained and torn items) drapes, towels, sheets, blankets, pillows, stuffed animals

Textile donations in any condition are welcome by most for-profit and nonprofit textile collectors alike.

Unacceptable donations:

wet/moldy items items contaminated with oil or hazardous substances

Check the textile collector bin for further information about what is accepted.
