Town Council Meeting – January 21, 2021

The January 21, 2021 Barnstable Town Council Meeting was physically closed to the public to avoid group congregation. The public was able to view through Live Streaming on the Town of Barnstable's website or Comcast Channel 18. Agenda Chaptering is not currently available for this meeting.

Town Council President Matthew Levesque began last night's <u>Town Council Meeting</u> with asking Town Councilor Tracey Shaughnessy to lead the reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance which was followed by a Moment of Silence. Mark S. Ells, Town Manager, presented his Town Manager Communications for the period of January 8-21, 2021:

- 1. Andy Clyburn, Assistant Town Manager, provided an update on COVID vaccination efforts.
- 2. As a reminder the Town of Barnstable continues to follow the Orders and Directives of our Governor. The Governor continues to frequently update these Orders and Directives. I encourage everyone to go to the Mass.gov COVID website or the Town of Barnstable website and read these Orders and Directives. Governor Baker announced a temporary Executive Order which took effect on December 26th and will continue until Sunday, January 24th, with a possibility of an extension. This temporary Order reduced allowable occupancy capacity levels from 40% to 25% in multiple sectors. We await further Orders and Directives from our Governor. As share by our Assistant Town Manager, key officials of the Town continue to meet daily to plan and implement proper actions which are in step with the Governor's orders and MA DPH guidelines.

During these times of increasing numbers of positive case counts and patient hospitalizations, we strongly urge everyone to follow the State guidelines and to take these basic precautions which include:

- Wear a face covering;
- Wash your hands frequently;
- Maintain proper physical distancing; and
- Stay home from work, school, sports and other activities when ill.

Our Public Health Nurses continue to contact those who become infected and those who have come in contact with positive cases to ensure they are appropriately isolated and are following the required quarantine precautions. If you should have any questions, call us at the Town of Barnstable Health Division Office at 508-862-4644.

- 3. We are proceeding with the tasks in the budget action calendar for FY 2022 as scheduled. Later this evening Mark Milne, Director of Finance, will share our fiscal projections as we prepare the FY 2022 budgets. This is the annual joint meeting/workshop with the Town Council/School Committee to review the financial condition of the Town. For information on our fiscal year budgets please view the Town's Open Budget website at http://budget.townofbarnstable.us.
- 4. On December 10, 2020 the Town Council held a Special Town Council meeting to review Fiscal Policy relative to the Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan (CWMP). In our effort to review the existing fiscal policy and potential changes for consideration by Town Council relevant to the CWMP Mark Milne, Director of Finance, provided a Fiscal Policy presentation regarding the CWMP that was focused on several financial options. One of the options for consideration is a draft Sewer Assessment Ordinance. Director Milne shared the draft ordinance with the Comprehensive Financial Advisory Committee (CFAC) on Monday, January 11, 2021. The comments of CFAC were generally supportive of the Ordinance as proposed and have continued the discussion to their next meeting on January 25, 2021. I have shared a summary of the comments to date by CFAC with Town Council and we await further comment resulting from their next meeting. The link to the draft ordinance can be found on our web page under Departments, Town Manager, Office Updates 2020-12-17 Initial Draft Sewer Assessment Ordinance. We plan to bring a final draft ordinance to Town Council for consideration after a public review process. Our communications and public engagement in the first quarter of calendar year 2021 is summarized on the attached schedule. We anticipate an aggressive effort to engage our citizens in the review of this fiscal policy discussion even with the challenges of COVID upon us. We plan to have the next fiscal policy workshop discussion with Town Council in early April 2021 after compiling public comments gathered in February and March. We will

keep you advised of our progress and bring back a final draft sewer assessment ordinance for your consideration upon satisfactorily completing a public process. www.townofbarnstable.us/Departments/TownManager/Office_Updates/-2020-12-17-INITIAL-DRAFT-Sewer-Assessment-Ordinance.pdf?tm

- 5. The Town of Barnstable Planning Board, together with the Town's Planning & Development Department, invites the public to a virtual meeting on Accessory Dwelling Units on Monday, January 25, 2021 from 6:00 7:30 p.m. The meeting will be on Zoom and meeting link is posted on the Town website. Additionally, the meeting will be broadcast live on Channel 18 and the Town of Barnstable Channel 18 website. The Town is considering an amendment to the zoning ordinance to allow Accessory Dwelling Units as accessory use to a single-family residential dwelling. The Town wants to share information with the community about Accessory Dwelling Units and get resident feedback on key issue areas. The Town Council Zoning & Regulatory Committee introduced the topic of Accessory Dwelling Units to discuss the potential for this housing option to increase the availability of year-round rental units; adapt single-family residential properties so they are supportive of residents at a variety of stages in their life cycle; and to encourage economic and efficient use of the Town's housing stock while maintaining the appearance and character of neighborhoods and remaining within our wastewater capacity limitations. A draft of the ordinance discussed by the Zoning & Regulatory Committee is available on their website and the Planning & Development Department website.
- 6. On January 20, 2021, I provided the Town Council with a memo outlining my response to the Citizens Request on December 16, 2020 regarding operationalizing the Town Council's Strategic Plan on communication and citizen's engagement related to residential zoning issues. I hope you will have time to review the memo and provide feedback. I am also preparing a response to recent communication from the Concerned Citizens of Centerville relative to the installation of antenna in the church steeple on Main Street Centerville. I hope to have a similar memo response for your review in the near future. In both cases, Town Council and Town Manager were included in the email therefore I felt it appropriate to provide the Town Manager response to Town Council for review before responding to our citizens.

7. Dan Santos, Director of Public Works, provided an update on the CWMP.

Mark Milne, Director of Finance, provided a <u>review of the financial condition of the Town</u> as we prepare the FY 2022 budgets during the **annual joint meeting/workshop with the Town Council/School Committee.**

OLD BUSINESS began with Town Attorney Karen Nober presenting **Agenda Item 2021-063** Appropriation Order in the amount of \$85,000 for the purpose of paying operating expenses of the Legal Department for the services of the law firm of Anderson & Kreiger which is serving as outside counsel to the Town with respect to two Notices of Intent to Sue received from the Conservation Law Foundation which was approved. **NEW BUSINESS** began with DPW Director Dan Santos presenting **Agenda Item 2021-065** Resolve accepting a grant in the amount of \$10,400 from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection for the purpose of enhancing the Town's Waste Reduction Programs which was approved. Solid Waste Division Supervisor Patrick Kelliher was also in attendance. Town Manager Mark Ells was joined by former Airport Manager Bud Breault, DPW Director Dan Santos, and Finance Director Mark Milne for **Agenda Item 2021-066** Resolve naming the Department of Public Works Administration Building located at 382 Falmouth Road, Hyannis, MA as the Captain Robert L. O'Brien Public Works Administration Building which was approved. **Agenda Item 2021-067** Appropriation Order in the amount of \$45,000 for the purpose of acquiring an easement on a portion of the property located at 528 Craigville Beach Road, Barnstable (Centerville) Massachusetts shown on Assessors Map 246 as Parcel 071 to be associated with the construction of new sewer infrastructure was referred to a Public Hearing on February 4, 2021. **Agenda Item 2021-068** Order authorizing a Housing Development Incentive Program Tax Increment Exemption Agreement between the Town of Barnstable and Pearl Street Holdings, LLC for 9 new market rate residential units located at 39 Pearl Street, Hyannis, MA was referred to Second Reading on February 4, 2021. Planning & Development Director Elizabeth Jenkins was joined by Attorney David Lawler for the presentation of **Agenda Item 2021**-069 Resolve approving an amendment to the Housing Development Incentive Program Zone and Plan to include 850 Falmouth Road & 3 Whitehall Way in Hyannis, MA, for submission to the Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) which was approved. *The next regularly scheduled Town Council Meeting will be held on Thursday, February 4, 2021 at 7:00 PM. Remote Participation Instructions will be available on the meeting Agenda and on the Town of Barnstable's website (www.townofbarnstable.us)*.

Town Manager Mark Ells' Community Update

Town Manager Mark Ells continues to provide updates through Channel 18 to keep people informed with accurate information about what is going on in the Town of Barnstable. In his latest <u>Community</u> <u>Update</u>, Mr. Ells shares information related to the state's 3 Phase rollout of the COVID-19 vaccine. Vaccinations started in December and we are still in Phase I. Assistant Town Manager Andy Clyburn's presentation to the Barnstable Town Council follows this update. He asks that you stay up-to-date on Governor Baker's orders and directives as they change daily. Please remain diligent with the protocols that will keep you, your family, and community safe. Mr. Ells also addresses the start of the budget season with last night's Joint Town Council/School Committee meeting. The Capital Improvements Plan will be submitted to the Town Council in March and taken up in April and the Operating Budget will be in June. Mr. Ells also addressed the Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan (CWMP) fiscal policy and DPW Director Dan Santos provided his monthly CWMP update. Mr. Ells introduced a public engagement plan for the CWMP and encourages all citizens to engage. New products are constantly coming out and parents need to be informed and know what they are looking at. Know and see what substances are available to your children and where they are often hidden in the home. Massachusetts COVID Vaccination Plan

The Massachusetts COVID Vaccination Plan was announced and conforms to the phases and prioritized populations identified by the Centers for Disease Control. <u>When can I get the COVID-19 vaccine?</u> <u>Mass.gov</u> During Phase 1, healthcare workers, older adults living in skilled nursing facilities, congregate care settings, emergency responders (police, fire, EMS), shelters, corrections, and other healthcare workers will be prioritized for vaccination as doses become available. As of this date, local health departments do not have any vaccines onsite for distribution or vaccinations. The first shipments of vaccine have been delivered to hospitals across the Massachusetts for vaccinations of their workers. The State contracted with CVS and Walgreens to arrange for vaccinations of patients and residents of long term care facilities.

Barnstable County Announces Region-wide Helpline to address COVID-19related Questions

15 Cape Cod Medical Reserve Corps Volunteers prepare to begin taking calls next Tuesday The Barnstable County Department of Health and Environment announced the launch of a regionwide helpline to respond to COVID-19 related questions . 15 Cape Cod Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) volunteers have been trained to answer questions about COVID-19, such as how to get a COVID-19 test or how to help someone navigate the three-phased approach to vaccination. The MRC helpline team can also walk residents through more complex questions, directing them to the right resources in their local communities and in other state government departments. Volunteers cannot provide individual clinical advice or a diagnosis through the helpline. If you believe you have been exposed to COVID-19 and are symptomatic, call your health care provider. **The helpline will be taking calls beginning next Tuesday, Monday through Friday, from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM at 1-774-330-3001.** Barnstable County wants to ensure residents that a coordinated response is taking place in our region. We remain committed to encouraging all citizens to wear a mask, maintain a physical distance of at least 6 feet, and wash hands for at least 20 seconds. - Figure skates with toe picks are strongly recommended for Figure Skating Clinic. Rink rental skates are NOT available for Clinic participants because they are not the best to learn in. Invest in your own skates so you have reliability when you need them and consistency for learning.
- Gloves and hats should be worn. Also, a heavy sweater or short jacket is recommended for better mobility.
- Helmets are required for all participants enrolled that are 6 years old and under. Helmets are also recommended for beginner level participants (Badge 1 & 2).
- Each Instructor will teach two badge levels within the 45 minute lesson. Sometimes there will be more than two badges taught. Each group will spend up to 20 mins with the Instructor. The other 25 mins will be used for participants to practice any of the skills. Parents should encourage their child to practice.
- Instructors reserve the right to move a child to the appropriate level class.
- Children in Kindergarten or 5 years old should sign up for Badge 1.
- Mask and/or face covering will be mandatory in the building and on the ice.

RUTH ANN KANE: @RUKANE123

Ruth is a Master at composing dynamic images. Imagined and suggestive of people, buildings, or interior spaces are motifs that appear and disappear in her work. She uses several different materials and techniques that surprise viewers.

"Paul Klee described a line as a dot that went for a walk. That's how I feel when my art takes me away on a



journey. I follow the dot, the line, the shape and I find myself lost on a mystery trip. I am eager to be immersed in the language of art, the elements of art, the freedom of experimentation, and the surprising feeling of detachment and lost sense of time when I'm in the zone. My art is evolving toward the abstract with the bold use of black ink, charcoal, collage and color play. ROAD WORK UPDATES

NEW Drainage Improvements on Long Beach Road in Centerville

Drainage structure installations on Long Beach Road in Centerville will be ongoing during the week of January 25, 2021. New drainage system structures and castings will be installed within the roadway between house #'s 153 and 177 for collection of stormwater. The disturbed section of the roadway will then be repaved and any areas disturbed during construction will be restored. This work is expected to take up to two weeks, weather permitting. Police details will be on site to assist traffic through the construction zone.

UPDATED Renovations to Oyster Harbor Bridge

The Town of Barnstable's contractor, MAS Building and Bridge, Inc. (MAS), is under contract to complete a rehabilitation project to the Oyster Harbors Bridge. The project will involve structural and safety repairs to the bridge, including replacement of steel stringers, replacement of abutment joints, repairs to columns supporting the bridge tender's house, and replacement of safety railings on the machine platform. To complete the improvements, one-lane of traffic will need to be closed for the duration of the project. Temporary traffic signals will be installed to manage traffic during this time. Single lane traffic will begin January 18, 2021. The project is scheduled to be completed by May 1, 2021. Once the lane closure begins, the draw-bridge will not be able to be opened for marine vessels passing under the bridge, until the completion of construction. Vessels that would require the draw bridge to be opened to pass under will need to seek an alternate route. Vessels that do not require the draw bridge to be opened will be able to continue to pass under the bridge. Marine vessels operating in the area should monitor the Notice to Mariners for updates and further detail relative to this project. Typical work hours will be Monday through Friday, 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM, though work during weekends may be necessary. Traffic will be impacted as a result of the lane closure and residents are encouraged to plan accordingly when traveling in this area. As always, please slow down and use extreme caution when traveling through or near construction areas, and follow posted safety signs.

UPDATED MassDOT Schedules Waterline Improvements at 691 Yarmouth

Road MassDOT's contractor, Robert B. Our, will be working within Yarmouth Road to install a new 8" waterline crossing. Work is scheduled to be performed on **Tuesday, January 26th and Wednesday, January 27th**, between the hours of 8:00 pm and 5:00 am. Traffic will be limited to hospital and local business traffic in the southbound lane only. This section of roadway will closed to northbound traffic. All other traffic will be detoured via Camp St. Message boards directing traffic will be provided, as well as Police details/flaggers as needed. Visit www.mass511.com, a website which provides real-time traffic and incident advisory information, and allows users to subscribe to text and email alerts for traffic conditions. Follow MassDOT on Twitter @MassDOT to receive regular updates on road and traffic conditions. Download MassDOT's GoTime mobile app and view real-time traffic conditions before setting out on the road.

UPDATED Bumps River Bridge Repairs on South Main Street in Centerville/Main Street in Osterville

Work on the bridge is scheduled to continue through mid-May 2021. Normal work hours are 7:00 AM to 5:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Remaining work will include improving riprap at bridge abutments, bridge deck repairs, improving endblocks and guardrail connections, and concrete repairs. The contractor is expected to deploy their construction craft from McCarthy's Landing (aka Hayward Landing) at 40 Hayward Road in Centerville. This may create brief delays for other users when the contractor is using the landing. The ramp will still be available for public access. The contractor is responsible for maintaining small vessel navigational access under the bridge at all times during construction. Mariners are urged to use caution and go slow when approaching and moving through the work area. Divers may be in the water at times during construction operations. Mariners are required to maintain proper distance from Dive and Alpha flags based on Maritime law. The bridge will remain open to traffic throughout construction. During this work there may be temporary single-lane closures with signs and police officers to direct traffic past the work zone.

CONTINUES Sewer Construction on Hyannis Avenue and Marstons Avenue

Robert B. Our Co., Inc. will be starting construction on a privately funded sewer extension on Hyannis Avenue and Marstons Avenue from 10 Hyannis Avenue to Nob Hill Road. The work will consist of the installation of approximately 1,250 feet of new sewers which, upon completion of the work, will become part of the municipal sewer system, and allow for adjacent properties to connect to the municipal sewer system. The disturbed roadways will be trench patched (temporary pavement) for the remainder of the winter. In the spring, the disturbed roadways will be milled and paved for the full road width. Weather pending, work began on December 21st and the work is anticipated to take six (6) weeks to complete. Work will be performed from 7:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday. Temporary detours will be necessary during the work. Police details and signage will direct motorists around the construction crews. Drivers are advised to seek alternate routes. As always, please slow down and use extreme caution when traveling through the construction area, and follow posted safety signs.

CONTINUES Water Works Construction on Longview Drive in Hyannis

The water works construction project, originally scheduled to start December 14th, is now scheduled to start January 4, 2021 on Longview Drive in Hyannis. This project will install approximately 500 feet of 8 inch water main and move the temporary interconnection with the COMM water system to a vacant lot on Longview Drive. The metal container will be enclosed in a building appropriate for the neighborhood. Normal works hours will be between 8:00 AM and 4:40 PM.

CONTINUES Drainage Improvements on Lake Shore Drive in Marstons Mills

Drainage improvements on Lake Shore Drive in Marstons Mills are on hold due to winter conditions. Contractor will be demobilizing until spring 2021.

CONTINUES MassDOT Schedules Intersection Improvements at Falmouth Road (Route 28) at Osterville West Barnstable Road

MassDOT Construction operations on the intersection at Falmouth Road (Route 28) at Osterville West Barnstable Road will continue through to April 2021. The road has been redesigned to include exclusive left turn lanes and improve bicycle and pedestrian accommodation as part of the proposed safety improvement work. The work to be done consists of furnishing and installing of new traffic signal equipment at the intersection including emergency vehicle pre-emption system, bicycle and vehicles loop detectors, construction of ADA compliant wheelchair ramps, sidewalks, and driveways, box widening, pavement milling and resurfacing, new pavement markings and signs, drainage improvements, water distribution modifications, existing utility pole relocations, installation of granite curbing, loam and seeding. Work will be performed during the day, Monday through Friday 7:00 AM-3:30 PM. Traffic control will include all required signage, channeling devices for lane shifts and alternating one-way traffic as required. Police details/ flaggers will be used as needed. CONTINUES Drainage & Pavement Improvements on Huckins Neck Road in Centerville/Barnstable Village

All drainage work is completed. The contractor will be demobilizing and returning in spring 2021 to complete roadway paving.

CONTINUES National Grid Service Road

National Grid has completed the installation of new gas main on Service Road in Barnstable. The gas line was activated on December 3rd, and the contractor will start demobilizing from the site in by mid-December. Work will be performed during the day, Monday through Friday from 6:00 AM to 6:00 PM. Service Road will remain open with one-lane of traffic. Police details/ flaggers will be used as needed. Final re-paving of Service Road is anticipated to be completed in spring 2021.

CONTINUES Bumps River Bridge Repairs on South Main Street in Centerville/Main Street in Osterville

Work on the bridge supports is scheduled to continue through mid-January 2021. Normal work hours are 7:00 AM to 5:30 PM, Monday through Friday; however, the work may be performed during nighttime and weekends based on tidal cycles and weather conditions. The contractor is expected to deploy their construction craft from McCarthy's Landing (aka Hayward Landing) at 40 Hayward Road in Centerville. This may create brief delays for other users when the contractor is using the landing. The ramp will still be available for public access. The contractor is responsible for maintaining small vessel navigational access under the bridge at all times during construction. Mariners are urged to use caution and go slow when approaching and moving through the work area. It is expected that divers will be in the water during construction operations. Mariners are required to maintain proper distance from Dive and Alpha flags based on Maritime law. The bridge will remain open to traffic throughout construction. During this work there may be temporary single-lane closures with signs and police officers to direct traffic past the work zone.

CONTINUES Sidewalk, Traffic Signal, Water Distribution, and Associated Improvements on Independence Drive in Hyannis and Barnstable Village, and on Portions of Mary Dunn Road, Kidd's Hill Road, and Attucks Lane in Barnstable Village

Construction is scheduled to end in May 2021. Normal work hours are 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Work will include a new sidewalk and additional drainage systems the full length of Independence Drive, on Mary Dunn Road a short distance south of Independence Drive, on Kidd's Hill Road from Independence Drive to Merchants Way, and on Attucks Lane from Independence Drive to Wilkens Lane. The work will also include a new traffic signal system at the intersection of Attucks Lane & Wilkens Lane; a watermain extension on portions of Attucks Lane and Independence Drive; and additional street lights on portions of Independence Drive and Kidd's Hill Road. During active

construction there will be lane closures with signs, cones/construction barrels, and police details or flaggers if necessary to direct traffic past the work zones.

CONTINUES Roadway Improvements on Portions of Main Street (Route 6A) and Mill Way in Barnstable Village

Construction is scheduled to continue into spring 2021. Normal work hours are 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Remaining work includes utility line transfers and pole removals in a few locations (by utility companies); constructing a sidewalk from Main Street to the County Complex parking lot east end; installing street lights; refurbishing traffic signals; and other associated work. During active construction there will be lane closures or temporary detours with signs and police details or flaggers to direct traffic past or around the work zones.
