Town Council Meeting – Thursday, July 15, 2021

The July 15, 2021 Town Council Meeting of the Barnstable Town Council was conducted remotely and physically closed to the public. The public was able to view through Comcast Channel 18 or Live Streaming on the Town of Barnstable's website. Town Council President Matt Levesque opened the meeting by inviting Town Councilor Paul Neary to lead the Pledge of Allegiance. Town Councilor Kris Clark offered a Moment of Silence in memory of Tim Ferreira, a 9-year member of the Hyannis Main Street Waterfront Historic District Commission, who passed away on Sunday, July 11th. President Levesque offered a Moment of Silence for Carol Puckett, Administrative Assistant in the Planning & Development Department to the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Land Acquisition and Preservation Committee, who passed on Saturday, July 10th. Ms. Puckett was a valued Town employee for 15 years and will be greatly missed. Next up was Public Comment. Due to the length of the Agenda, Town Manager Mark Ells did not present his Town Manager Communications, however, they can be viewed here. OLD BUSINESS began with Town Councilor Jessica Rapp Grassetti presenting those agenda items for appointments and reappointments. Agenda Item 2021-130 Appointments to a Board/Committee/Commission: Conservation Commission; Council on Aging; Mid Cape Cultural Council; Infrastructure and Energy Committee; Planning Board; Recreation Commission; Sandy Neck Board; Waterways Committee; and Youth Commission members which were approved. Councilor Eric Steinhilber recused himself from Agenda Item 2021-130B Appointment to a Board/Committee/Commission: Youth Commission member which was approved. Agenda Item 2021-181 Reappointments to a Board/ Committee/Commission: Airport Commission; Board of Assessors; Board of Health; Community Preservation Committee; Comprehensive Financial Advisory Committee; Conservation Commission; Council On Aging; Disability Commission; Elderly & Disabled Taxation Aid Committee; Golf Committee; Historical Commission; Housing Committee; Infrastructure and Energy Committee; John F. Kennedy Memorial Trust Fund Committee; Land Acquisition and Preservation Committee; Licensing Authority; Mid Cape Cultural Council; Old King's Highway Historic District Committee; Planning Board; Recreation Commission; Registrar of Voters; Sandy Neck Board; Shellfish Committee; Youth Commission; and Zoning

Board of Appeals. Town Councilor Clark submitted an amendment to the members of the Shellfish Committee which was approved and the item as amended was approved. President Levesque recused himself from Agenda Items 2021-130A, 2021-181A, 2021-174 and 2021-175. Vice President Paula Schnepp assumed control of the meeting. Agenda Items 2021-130A Appointment to a Board/Committee/Commission: Youth Commission member and Agenda Item 2021-181A Reappointments to a Board/Committee/Commission: Youth Commission were approved. Vice President Schnepp reserved the right to participate in discussion for Agenda Items 2021-174 and 2021-175. Assistant Town Clerk Janet Murphy said the gavel would then get passed to Precinct 1 Councilor Gordon Starr who also wished to reserve the right to participate in those items. Assistant Town Clerk Murphy said the gavel would then pass to Precinct 2 Councilor Eric Steinhilber who took control of the meeting. Councilor Steinhilber introduced Planning and Development Director Elizabeth Jenkins to present a summary of Agenda Item 2021-174 Amending Article XIV, Chapter 240, Section 128 of the Zoning Ordinance to add a definition for Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) and Dwelling Unit, and revise the definition of Dwelling, Single-Family and add Article V, Chapter 240, Section 47.2 Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) to the Zoning Ordinance. The Town Council discussed three amendments. Two of those amendments were incorporated into the item which was approved. Director Jenkins presented Agenda Item 2021-175 Amending Article XIV, Chapter 240, Section 128 of the Zoning Ordinance to revise the definition of Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) and amending Article V, Chapter 240, Section 47.2(C)(4) to allow ADUs with greater than 900 square feet by special permit from the Zoning Board of Appeals which was approved. President Levesque returned to the meeting and Director Jenkins, joined by Wayne Kurker and Attorney Mike Ford to present Agenda Item 2021-182 Regulatory Development Agreement with 77 Pleasant Street Realty Trust /Wayne Kurker Trustee to Redevelop 77 Pleasant Street, Hyannis with an 81 space gravel parking lot. The redevelopment also includes relocating an existing historic residential two-family dwelling within 21 feet of Pleasant Street which will continue as a two-family dwelling which was approved. Community Preservation Committee Chair Lindsey Counsell and Barnstable Historic Society Board Member Rich French to present Agenda Item 2021-187 Appropriation Order in the amount of **\$89,950** in Community Preservation Funds for the restoration work to the Barnstable Historic Society Inc.'s building at 3087 Main Street/Rte. 6A, Barnstable which was approved. NEW BUSINESS began with Finance Director Mark Milne presenting Agenda Item 2022-001 Acceptance of a State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund Grant in the amount of \$7,692,669 from the U.S. Department of the Treasury for the purpose of responding to the economic and public health impacts to the community from COVID-19 which was approved. Agenda Item 2022-002 Supplemental Appropriation Order in the amount of \$15,000 for the purpose of paying operating expenses of the Legal Department for the services of the law firm of Anderson & Kreiger which is serving as outside counsel to the Town with respect to two lawsuits filed against the Town by the Conservation Law Foundation was referred to a Public Hearing on August 5, 2021. Community Preservation Agenda Items 2022-003 Appropriation and Transfer Order in the amount of \$816,793 from Community Preservation Undesignated Funds for the renovation of Centerville Recreation Playground located at 524 Main Street, Centerville, MA and Agenda Item 2022-004 Appropriation and Transfer Order in the amount of \$125,000 from Open Space/Recreation Community Preservation Funds for the renovation of Barnstable Hollow Field Playground located at 0 Millway, Barnstable, MA were referred to Public Hearings on August 19, 2021. Director Jenkins presented Agenda Item 2022-006 Acceptance of a Transformative Development Initiative (TDI) Challenge Grant in the amount of \$45,000 from the Massachusetts Development Finance Agency's TDI Challenge Grants Program for support for temporary "Pop Up" Retail and Food Service which was approved. Agenda Item 2022-007 Amending the Code of the Town of Barnstable, Part I General Ordinances, Chapter 240 Zoning by adding a Mixed-Use Sub Zone of the Medical Services Overlay District was given a First Reading and referred to the Planning Board. A SPECIAL MEETING will be held on August 5, 2021 to discuss Fiscal Policy. The next regularly scheduled Town Council Meeting will be held on Thursday, August 19, 2021. The meeting Agenda will be available on the Town of Barnstable's website (www.townofbarnstable.us).

School Committee Meeting – Tuesday, July 13, 2021

The July 13th School Committee meeting highlights included Summer Learning Opportunities for students, the new Special Education Procedure Manual available online, and community members and retired educators, Paul and Nancy Thompson, speaking about the Barnstable No Place for Hate Report Listening Sessions. Co-Directors of Special Education, Eric Bruinooge and Catherine Zinni, spoke about the process the district went through to have the new Special Education Procedure Manual online. The manual is an informational resource for parents/guardians and staff. It can be found on the BPS website: www.barnstable.k12.ma.us/Page/5422. Community members and retired educators, Paul and Nancy Thompson, spoke about the Barnstable No Place for Hate Report Listening Sessions. They showed the Committee a 12-minute video of interviews with several Barnstable students speaking about their experiences with racism and what the students would like the adults to do differently in their response to racism. Paul and Nancy have also worked with BPS staff for a professional development day this spring. They stated that Barnstable is doing the hard work, but there is still more work to be done. Dear Town of Barnstable Property Owner:

Excessive nutrient enrichment of the region's groundwater and waterbodies, caused by improper or excessive applications of fertilizer, may result in significant public health ramifications. Some of these ramifications include detrimental effects on drinking water sources by increased concentrations of nitrates. This can have a negative impact on economic, environmental, and recreational resources and values in the Town and region.

We would like to remind all property owners about the provisions of the Town's Fertilizer Nitrogen and Phosphorous Control Regulations, identified as Chapter 78 of the Town of Barnstable Code. This Chapter may be viewed at this link:

Everyone is reminded of the following dos and don'ts:

DONT'S:

- · Don't apply fertilizer during or immediately prior to heavy rainfall;
- · Don't apply fertilizer or compost between November 12 and the following March 31;
- Don't apply, spill, or deposit fertilizer onto any impervious surfaces;
- Don't apply, spill, or deposit fertilizer in a manner that allows fertilizer to enter any storm drains;
- Don't apply fertilizer that contains phosphorous, unless a soil test was taken not more than 3 years
 prior, which indicates phosphorous is needed for growth of that turf, or unless establishing a new
 turf, reestablishing turf, or repairing turf after substantial damage or land disturbance; and
- Don't deposit grass clippings, leaves or any other vegetative debris into or within 50 feet of water bodies, retention areas, drainage ditches, stormwater drains, or onto impervious surfaces.

DO'S:

- Do ensure a single application of fertilizer that contains nitrogen does not exceed 1.0 pounds of actual nitrogen per thousand square feet;
- Do ensure single application of fertilizer shall consist of at least 20% slow-release nitrogen; and do
 ensure the annual application rate of fertilizer does not exceed 3.2 pounds of actual nitrogen per
 thousand square feet.

Failure to comply with these provisions of Section 78 may result in an order for a citizen to obtain fertilizer application certification and/or may result in the issuance of \$300 non-criminal ticket citations for each violation.

Any noncertified fertilizer applicator may apply to the Cape Cod Cooperative Extension for fertilizer certification as a certified fertilizer applicator. All certified fertilizer applicators shall manage turf and apply fertilizer to turf in accordance with Best Management Practices (BMP) for Soil and Nutrient Management in Turf Systems, prepared by the University of Massachusetts Extension, Center for Agriculture Turf Program in effect on September 18, 2014

This letter shall serve as a reminder to all citizens about the Town's Fertilizer Nitrogen and Phosphorous Control Regulations in an effort to prevent further declines in the quality of our groundwater and waterbodies. By working together, we will be able to begin to restore the health of our aquatic ecosystems that are so important to our quality of life here in Barnstable

Cape Cod welcomes visitors from all over the world, which is why it's more important than ever to track COVID-19 exposures and spread. MassNotify is an important tool to help you do just that. It's not an application that you buy through the app store - it's a simple adjustment to the settings on your phone. And it's completely private and anonymous! The service is strictly to make you aware of a potential exposure so that you can take the appropriate precautions.

- Scroll down to Exposure Notifications
- Click "Turn on Exposure Notifications"
- Click "Continue"
- Select United States, then select Massachusetts
- Follow the instructions on the following

Cyanobacteria Notice



As we enter the summer season, we wanted to let you know the Town is planning to resume cyanobacteria monitoring and reporting. However, this program will have a delayed start this year due to unanticipated staff turnover. We expect the program to resume in July. Until this program is back up and running, we wanted to provide some tips to identify cyanobacteria blooms, what to do if you suspect a bloom, and who to contact.

Identifying Cyanobacteria Blooms

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health has provided examples of cyanobacteria blooms with scums and without scums. <u>https://www.mass.gov/service-details/identifying-cyanobacterial-blooms-and-scums-photographs-of-blooms-and-scums</u>

How do I know if there is a harmful algal bloom in the water?

Cyanobacteria can cause the water to appear slightly discolored, cloudy, or resemble pea soup or paint. They are usually blue or green but can also be brown or red. They can also give the water a bad odor. The cyanobacteria in some blooms are dispersed throughout the water, while in other blooms they are concentrated in a scum or mat, either on the surface of the water or in sediment along the shoreline.

What if you Suspect a Cyanobacteria Bloom?

WHEN IN DOUBT, STAY OUT!

If you see a possible cyanobacteria bloom, avoid contact with the water.

Sign Up for Cynobacteria Alerts

Last month, the Town contracted with the Association to Preserve Cape Cod (APCC) to conduct routine monitoring and reporting of Cyanobacteria in Barnstable's Lakes and Ponds. If you are interested in receiving an email notification, when a potentially toxic bloom is identified by APCC, you <u>must opt-in</u> to the APCC toxic alerts. Do Your "Doody" for Clean Water

You hate stepping in it. And fish hate swimming in it, too! Dogs produce a lot of waste which, if not disposed of properly, can end up in our waterways. Do your part to keep our waters and public areas clean and healthy! Bag your pet's waste and throw it in a trashcan..



Did you know that the average dog can produce nearly a pound of waste each day?

- · Pet waste left on lawns and in public spaces is not only gross. It can be quite harmful too.
- Pet waste contains twice as much bacteria as human waste!
- If left in your yard, pet waste can kill grass and other plants.
- Adults and children who come in contact with it can get sick.
- When pet waste washes into storm drains and waterways, it can make the water unhealthy for people and wildlife.
- Pet waste in waterways can even cause algae to grow, making the water turn an unpleasant green color.

Do your "doody" in both public areas and in your yard.

To help keep our waterbodies clean and to comply with **Barnstable's General By-Laws (Part I; Chapter 403; Section 403-7 Nuisances Committed by Dogs)**, always carry a plastic bag or other collection means with you when you walk your dog and be sure to pick up your dog's poop and dispose of it in a trash can. Citations and penalties between \$25.00 (first offense) and \$50.00 (second offense) can be issued for failing to meet these requirements.

As we enter our summer season the Town of Barnstable would like to remind owners of rental properties that they are required to register rental units with the Town of Barnstable Health Division; this includes ALL rentals from annual to summer to short-term. The requirement to register rental properties has been in place in Barnstable since 2006.

Submissions by mail: Use one form for each unit to be registered and return to the Public Health Division, 200 Main Street, Hyannis, MA 02601.

There is a fee of \$90 and \$25 for *each* additional unit on the **same** parcel. The check should be payable to: <u>Town of Barnstable</u>.

Failure to comply with this Ordinance may result in the issuance of a non-criminal ticket citation in the amount of \$100.

We are also pleased to announce that we now have a short term rental complaint hotline available for the public to submit any complaints concerning short-term rental properties. The hotline is available on-line through our Health Division website or by phone 24 hours a day at 508-504-9779.

Distribution of Oral Rabies Vaccine (ORV) Baits from July 12-23

In May, the first raccoon-variant rabies case in over 8 years was documented in Hyannis on Cape Cod. In response, USDA implemented an emergency trap-vaccinate-release (TVR) campaign throughout the mid-Cape to prevent the disease from spreading. Close to 700 unique raccoons were live-captured, vaccinated against rabies, tagged, and released at the site of capture. To further mitigate the potential for disease spread, the distribution of oral rabies vaccine (ORV) baits on the Cape Cod will occur from July 12-23 in the towns of Bourne, Sandwich, Falmouth, Mashpee, Barnstable, Yarmouth, Dennis, Brewster, Harwich, Chatham, and Orleans. Approximately 69,900 ORV baits will be distributed Capewide; 57,000 will be distributed via helicopter and 12,900 will be distributed by hand (ground vehicles). People and pets cannot get rabies from contact with the baits but are asked to leave them undisturbed should they encounter them. If contact with an ORV bait occurs, immediately rinse the area with warm water and soap and

It is important to note that the baits are not toxic to pets but may cause an upset stomach if ingested due to the richness of the bait attractant. As a reminder, the translocation of wildlife by the public is strictly prohibited. By not relocating wildlife, people help to prevent the spread of rabies and other diseases to non-infected areas.

As always please slow down and use extreme caution when traveling through the road construction areas and follow posted safety and detour signs.

UPDATED Rendezvous Lane Wastewater Pump Station Replacement Project

The Town of Barnstable's contractor, Robert B. Our Co., Inc., is under contract to complete a wastewater pump station replacement project at the intersection of Rendezvous Lane, Kent Road and Salten Point Road. The project involves a new below grade precast concrete wet well and valve vault, pumping system, control panel, standby generator and gravity sewer main to replace the existing wastewater pump station at the Town Right of Way to Barnstable Harbor at the end of Rendezvous Lane. The improvements are necessary to replace the existing pump station approaching the end of its intended service life and to relocate the new pump station above the FEMA base flood elevation. Typical work hours are 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM, with groundwater dewatering pumps and sewer bypass pumps occasionally requiring 24/7 operation. Remaining work includes restoration of disturbed areas.

UPDATED Drainage & Pavement Improvements on Wheeler Road in Marstons Mills

Drainage and pavement improvements on Wheeler Road in Marstons Mills are currently on-going and will continue during the week of July 19, 2021. The remaining work will include the raising of structures to finished grade, installation of additional curb inlets, final asphalt paving and restoration of all disturbed areas. Please use caution and safe speeds when traveling on Wheeler Road during construction operations.

CONTINUES Drainage Improvements on Lake Shore Drive in Marstons Mills

The Town's contractor, Tasco Construction, will continue drainage improvements at five (5) locations along Head of the Pond Rd and Lake Shore Drive in Marstons Mills. The work includes installation of new drainage systems, repairs to existing drainage systems, adjustment of drainage structure castings, and restoration of any areas disturbed during construction. Normal work hours will be between 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Through traffic will be maintained throughout construction. Any lane closures will be supported with police details to direct traffic. Motorists are advised to seek alternate routes to avoid the construction work.
