



Terminal Building Named at Cape Cod Gateway Airport

The Cape Cod Gateway Airport is naming the terminal building in honor of aviation pioneers Russell Boardman and John Polando. This will commemorate the 90th anniversary of their record-breaking journey across the Atlantic Ocean. The building will be called the *Russell Boardman and John Polando Terminal Building*.

Background: During the summer of 1930, Boardman and Polando trained at the Hyannis Airport (now known as the Cape Cod Gateway Airport) for their overseas flight. They considered the HYA air strip to be their home base which encouraged Boardman to rename his Bellanca Special J-6 monoplane to “Cape Cod.” They took off from Floyd Bennet Field in New York City on July 28th, 1931 and landed on July 30th at Yesilkoy Airport in Istanbul, Turkey, a distance of 5,011.8 miles. Their flight was the first recorded transatlantic flight since Lindbergh's in 1927 and set a new non-stop distance world record. Boardman and Polando flew 49 hours and eight minutes in a single engine plane, stripped of doors, radio, brakes and lights to accommodate every ounce of fuel possible. Some 728 gallons of gasoline had been stowed in metal cans throughout the plane. All but five gallons was used on the trip. They landed with 15 minutes of fuel to spare. A large meteorological map and a compass served as their navigation tools. In 1981, the airfield at HYA was renamed Boardman/Polando Field to recognize their accomplishment. **Cape Cod Connection:** Russell N. Boardman was born in Connecticut in 1898. His family had a home on Bass River in South Yarmouth, Massachusetts. For a year—1930— Mr. Boardman ran Hyannis Airport. In 1931, his Bellanca came with the name *American Legion*, but he promptly changed it to *Cape Cod*. John L. Polando was born into a large Lynn, Massachusetts family in 1901. His first Cape Cod flights were as a member of the Massachusetts Air Guard's summer encampment at what is now Cape Cod Airport in Marstons Mills. Mr. Polando retired to Cape Cod in 1972, spending his days at Hyannis Airport often flying banners.



Purpose

The Downtown Hyannis Rezoning effort is a major step towards implementing the goals presented within the Town’s Local Comprehensive Plan, Housing Production Plan, and the Growth Incentive Zone Strategic Plan with a particular focus on increasing residential and mixed-use development, and defining specifications for building form and placement that respond to local context through scale, and design considerations. The focus of this effort is to create a predictable regulatory framework that encourages compact residential development, compatible with traditional development patterns, meeting a range of housing needs. The proposed


amendment additionally aligns with modern form-based code techniques which focus on the physical form of development, emphasizing a strong relationship between the building and the broader context, public spaces, streets, surrounding buildings and the use of frontage areas, unlike traditional zoning which predominately focuses on the type of use allowed on the land.



The conceptual illustration above represents the intent of this zoning amendment with a focus on promoting an increase in multi-family and mixed-use density while establishing a stronger relationship between the development and the greater context through the form and placement of buildings.

Area of Focus

This proposal focuses on downtown Hyannis, the area designated as the Growth Incentive Zone (GIZ), and the existing “Hyannis Village Zoning Districts,” all currently served by public sewer and water. Hyannis serves as the regional commercial and transportation hub of the Cape. Achieving a greater density of jobs and housing within the GIZ supports the community’s vision of a vibrant, livable, mixed-use, walkable regional center. More dense, compact housing options paired within buildings that respond Hyannis’ unique character can support a mix of housing choices for all ages and incomes while encouraging healthier and more sustainable lifestyles.

West Nile Virus Identified in 12 Mosquito Samples Collected in Barnstable, Middlesex, and Suffolk Counties

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health has identified 12 West Nile virus positive mosquito samples collected in Barnstable, Middlesex and Suffolk Counties. The populations of mosquito vectors that transmits WNV and EEE are above average and increasing due to intense regional precipitation events and continued warm weather. Avoid mosquito bites by using EPA approved repellents, appropriate clothing and avoiding peak mosquito activity between dusk and dawn. Remove standing water by emptying containers and tarps. 

As we enter the summer season, we wanted to let you know the Town is planning to resume cyanobacteria monitoring and reporting. However, this program will have a delayed start this year due to unanticipated staff turnover. We expect the program to resume in July. Until this program is back up and running, we wanted to provide some tips to identify cyanobacteria blooms, what to do if you suspect a bloom, and who to contact.

Identifying Cyanobacteria Blooms

How do I know if there is a harmful algal bloom in the water?

Cyanobacteria can cause the water to appear slightly discolored, cloudy, or resemble pea soup or paint. They are usually blue or green but can also be brown or red. They can also give the water a bad odor. The cyanobacteria in some blooms are dispersed throughout the water, while in other blooms they are concentrated in a scum or mat, either on the surface of the water or in sediment along the shoreline.

What if you Suspect a Cyanobacteria Bloom?

WHEN IN DOUBT, STAY OUT!

If you see a possible cyanobacteria bloom, avoid contact with the water.

Cape Cod Climate Action Plan Approved by the Cape Cod Commission

First of its kind plan for Cape Cod sets actionable goals to address climate change

The Cape Cod Commission approved the region's first-ever climate action plan during its July 22, 2021 meeting. The [Cape Cod Climate Action Plan](#) sets actionable goals for Cape Cod, within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts framework. It is intended to foster collaborative, targeted action to address climate change in measurable ways. The plan identifies strategies and actions the region can take to mitigate the Cape's contributions to climate change and adapt to its impacts. Input gathered from a wide range of stakeholders in an extensive and collaborative region-wide engagement and outreach effort informed the plan, along with a regional greenhouse gas emissions inventory, an economic and fiscal impact analysis, and a legal and jurisdictional analysis. The final plan incorporates feedback from hundreds of stakeholders across the region. The plan targets the region's highest emitting sectors, transportation and energy, as identified in the greenhouse gas emissions inventory, and includes strategies that apply more broadly to support successful implementation. Strategies outlined will require action across all sectors and actors, including all levels of

government, businesses, non-governmental organizations, and others. "The Commission was challenged to provide a meaningful plan for our region to address both the causes and effects of climate change," Executive Director Kristy Senatori said. "The plan approved meets that challenge, offering multiple paths forward to address the effects already felt and reduce those yet to come." Priority strategies for mitigating greenhouse gas emissions include reducing energy consumption and striving towards net zero energy buildings; promoting efficient land-use policies and development patterns; generating and increasing the use of safe, reliable, and clean energy; reducing vehicle miles traveled and supporting low and no carbon transportation options; accelerating the electrification of the transportation system; and reducing emissions by increasing and enhancing natural carbon storage. Priority strategies for adapting to the impacts of climate change include addressing vulnerabilities in public infrastructure and the road network; identifying approaches for managing development in coastal resource areas; and addressing vulnerable buildings and structures through retrofits and relocation. Measuring progress towards meeting the goals of the Climate Action Plan will require both long-term tracking of regional performance measures and shorter-term tracking of the implementation of specific strategies and actions. Updates to the regional greenhouse gas emission inventory, tracking of regional performance measures, and communication of regional progress will be key in ensuring effective implementation. The Climate Action plan calls on all sectors of our community to work together to reduce risk, make communities more resilient, and shift behavior to reduce the region's contributions to the causes of climate change. Did you know that the average dog can produce nearly a pound of waste each day?

- Pet waste left on lawns and in public spaces is not only gross. It can be quite harmful too.
- Pet waste contains twice as much bacteria as human waste!
- If left in your yard, pet waste can kill grass and other plants.
- Adults and children who come in contact with it can get sick.
- When pet waste washes into storm drains and waterways, it can make the water unhealthy for people and wildlife.
- Pet waste in waterways can even cause algae to grow, making the water turn an unpleasant green color.

Do your "doody" in both public areas and in your yard.

To help keep our waterbodies clean and to comply with **Barnstable's General By-Laws (Part I; Chapter 403; Section 403-7 Nuisances Committed by Dogs)**, always carry a plastic bag or other collection means with you when you walk your dog and be sure to pick up your dog's poop and dispose of it in a trash can. Citations and penalties between \$25.00 (first offense) and \$50.00 (second offense) can be issued for failing to meet these requirements.

ROAD WORK UPDATES

As always please slow down and use extreme caution when traveling through the road construction areas and follow posted safety and detour signs.

***New* National Grid New Customer Hookups**

Wednesday, August 4, 2021 Neuco crews will be working on gas services on Cammett Road, Marstons Mills. Thursday, August 5 2021 Neuco crews will be working on gas services on 25 Joan Road, Centerville. Friday, August 6 2021 Neuco crews will be working on gas services on Cotuit Bay Drive, Cotuit. Typical natural gas service installation includes marking out underground utilities within the project area, excavation of the street, laying gas main, relaying customer's individual gas service and connecting those services to the main and installing meters. This project should take about five days to complete. Visit ngrid.com/service line to view a YouTube video explaining the replacement of the service pipe to customer homes. Operations will start promptly at 7:00 AM and run until 3:00 PM. Reduce speed, and use caution. All scheduled work is dependent on weather and/or may be impacted due to an emergency situation.

***UPDATED* Drainage & Pavement Improvements on Wheeler Road in Marstons Mills**

Drainage and pavement improvements on Wheeler Road in Marstons Mills are currently on-going and will continue during the week of August 2, 2021. The remaining work will include the raising of structures to finished grade, final asphalt paving and restoration of all disturbed areas. Please use caution and safe speeds when traveling on Wheeler Road during construction operations.

***CONTINUES* Rendezvous Lane Wastewater Pump Station Replacement Project**

The Town of Barnstable's contractor, Robert B. Our Co., Inc., is under contract to complete a wastewater pump station replacement project at the intersection of Rendezvous Lane, Kent Road and Salten Point Road. The project involves a new below grade precast concrete wet well and valve vault, pumping system, control panel, standby generator and gravity sewer main to replace the existing wastewater pump station at the Town Right of Way to Barnstable Harbor at the end of Rendezvous Lane. The improvements are necessary to replace the existing pump station approaching the end of its intended service life and to relocate the new pump station above the FEMA base flood elevation. Typical work hours are 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM, with groundwater dewatering pumps and sewer bypass pumps occasionally requiring 24/7 operation. Remaining work includes restoration of disturbed areas.

***CONTINUES* Drainage Improvements on Lake Shore Drive in Marstons Mills**

The Town's contractor, Tasco Construction, will continue drainage improvements at five (5) locations along Head of the Pond Rd and Lake Shore Drive in Marstons Mills. The work includes installation of new drainage systems, repairs to existing drainage systems, adjustment of drainage structure castings, and restoration of any areas disturbed during construction. Normal work hours will be between 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Through traffic will be maintained throughout construction. Any lane closures will be supported with police details to direct traffic. Motorists are advised to seek alternate routes to avoid the construction work.
