



Some cyanobacteria blooms can look like foam, scum, or mats, particularly when the wind blows them toward a shoreline.


The blooms can be blue, bright green, brown, or red. Blooms sometimes look like paint floating on the water's surface.



DROUGHT STATUS

The Massachusetts Executive
Office of Energy and

declared a Level 3 – Critical
Drought in the Northeast,
Central, Connecticut River Valley
Southeast, and now Cape Cod
Regions, a Level 2 – Significant
Drought in the Western, and
Islands Regions.

CURRENT CONDITIONS

The state has experienced over seven months of below normal rainfall and the drought has intensified across the state, since the onset of the drought, regions are experiencing between a four and ten inch deficit in precipitation. The risk of wild fires is increasing and unusually dry topsoil and groundcover vegetation causing fires to burn deeper and longer. Streamflow is severely impacted with dry stream beds and ponding, higher water temperatures and increased algal growth. Drought conditions are impacting our farms, with losses in soil moisture, more heavy irrigation needed and initial signs of crop loss.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Residents, Facilities & Businesses:

ALL DROUGHT REGIONS

- · Conserve water use
- Run dishwashers & washing machines at full capacity
- · Take shorter showers
- Fix Leaks
- Be careful with outdoor flames
- Ban on open flame & charcoal fires at state parks

OUTDOOR WATER USE RESTRICTIONS

LEVEL 2: Limit to hand-held 5:00 pm - 9:00 am

LEVEL 3: Ban on all non-essential outdoor water use

Cities & Towns:

- Limit outdoor watering as per drought level restrictions for your region
- · Limit new landscapes and outdoor washing
- Check emergency connections and interconnections with other water suppliers
- · Implement drought or seasonal water rates
- Establish water use reduction targets
- · Establish a leak detection program
- Develop/refine local drought plan for water supply
